A novelty revived from the annals of flyfishing's history, two-handed rods are now commonplace on steelhead rivers. The snake roll, single spey, zip-T, Perry Poke, double spey, overhead and Skagit casting are just a few of the casts used by anglers today. Different rods, lines, casts, and flies make a difference in the performance of a cast and the presentation of the fly. This is an outstanding opportunity to try different combinations and learn new techniques. Beginner or expert come learn, teach, and catch steelhead.

We will meet one-mile above the confluence of the Snake and Grande Ronde Rivers at the legendary Shadow run. Casting will begin after the morning's fish, sometime around 11:00. FLY OF THE MONTH

Lars Bucktail Minnow February, 2003 Ray D. Larson

One of the many benefits of attending the FFF conclaves is the opportunity to watch fly tiers from around the world tie their own special creations. At this summer's conclave in Idaho Fails, Bob Bates picked up this month's fly from Ray Larson, a guide from Wisconsin and Minnesota. It is a bait fish pattern that Ray uses for Muskies and other large predator species. It is easy to tie and, in various sizes and colors, it can be used anywhere from freshwater to the big salt.

Hook: Mustad signature C7OSD **Thread:** Gudebrod G or GX2 **Tail:** Silver or gold tinsel

Overtail: Bucktail color or colors of choice


Underbody: White yarn

Overbody and head: Super G body tubing or E-Z body

(large) **Eyes:** Doll eyes

Permanent markers - optional Weed guard 30 Lb. Mono - optional Head overbody coat: 4-6 minute epoxy

- 1. Pinch the barb and line the hook with tying thread. Tie in 10-15 strands of tinsel for the center flash of the tail.
- 2. Make the tail by tying in small bunches of bucktail two white bunches on the bottom and a darker shade for the top. Add a few strands of tinsel along the .sides. Cement the ties.
- 3. Tie in and wrap the yarn underbody just in front of the bucktail. (If you want a weighted fly, some turns of lead wire can be placed around the hook shank before the underbody is wound on.) Attach the body tubing behind the eye of the hook, facing forward as shown. Tie this in very securely, whip finish, cement, and cut off the tying thread.
- 4. Push the tubing back over the fly to form the overbody. The end can be frayed a bit if it doesn't happen automatically. If you want to add color to the fly with permanent markers, do so now. Attach the eyes with your favorite cement. Apply a coat of fast drying epoxy to the head and overbody. Ray lets it harden on a turning wheel.
