Both the Department Director and the Deputy Director were present. Their input provided me with needed information on budget and Department operations. The Group is chaired by Bob Gibbons, Inland/Steelhead Resources State Manager, by the way, an excellent fly fisherman.

FLYOF THE MONTH

Dr. P's Jiggy Leach March 2005 Mark Pinch

Jerry McBride's jig-type fly pattern in the January bulletin has prompted another stalwart fly fisher to come out of the closet. Mark Pinch admits that he has been using jig hooks for a leech pattern that has proven very successful for a long time. It is very easy to tie and, fished properly, it imitates the slow, pulsing movement of the leeches. Mark suggests several points for fishing the Jiggy Leech to best advantage. Use a big enough strike indicator to keep the fly suspended at the right depth. The right depth is a couple of inches above the bottom or weed growth. It works best in water about 6 feet or less deep. It is most effective in low light situations, i.e. early or late in the day or on overcast days. Fish the leech very slowly. It is less effective in choppy water. Strikes are often vicious, so set the hook softly to avoid break offs.


Hook: 1/16 oz. #8 or 6 jig hook

Thread: Black monocord


Body - Tail: Strip of rabbit skin and two turns of sparkle chenille. Black, olive, brown, purple are the best colors.



- 1 Pinch the barb and line the hook with tying thread just behind the head.
- 2 Trim the rabbit fur to 1/4 to 3/8" long. Put the hook through the rabbit skin with enough left dangling for the tail. Tie in just behind the lead head.
- 3. Tie in a couple of turns of sparkle chenille just behind the lead head. Whip finish and cement.
