Longtime IEFFC member Peter Pagnutti passed away November 12, 2007, about six weeks before his 100th birthday. He was a strong supporter of IEFFC and very energetic contributor to club projects. On trips, business and personal, he always took copies of *Flies of the Northwest* and sold them to the people and shops he visited. For many years he was the club's major distributor. BB

Pete Pagnutti was a great believer in Pflueger Medalist fly reels. He even fished for bonefish on flats of Belize with them. He and Karl Paulson teamed up on one trip that included several fly club members. His reel of choice: a big Pflueger Medalist. A 3- to 4-pound bonefish Pete hooked took off over the flat at a speed so high that the spinning spool flew apart. Pete didn't give up on the reel. He made some adjustments and continued using the reel. I don't know whether he ever upgraded his reels. Like Mike Runje, if a cheap reel or cheap rod performed OK, he'd go for the low-priced stuff even though he had plenty of money to buy the best. FR

Pete was a generous man with his time. When I got into trouble installing tile around my bathtub, Pete came over to my house and did it for me. He didn't want me to pay him. That was 30 years ago and the tile is still over the tub. FR

After he released it he sat down and said "Some Tiddler!." That was the start of many annual trips to The Bow. HK

Most of the old timers used Pflueger Medalist fly reels and many still do. Pete landed many fish with his Pfluegers and released them to fight another day. He was a stalwart member of IEFFC. Pete will continue to be in our thoughts for years to come. BB

FLY OF THE MONTH

The Orange Connection

December, 2007

This month's pattern is bright enough to use as a Christmas tree ornament but it, and variations of it, have produced very well for me at many area lakes. Most recently the orange bombshell took several 3 to 7 pound Lahontans at Lenore Lake when partner Doug Brossoit and I seemed to be the only fishermen catching anything. Brown's Lake Cutts, Bows, and Cuttbows love it, as do the Cutts at Yokum. In fact, it has produced well everywhere I've used it -- Amber, Williams, Farmer Brown's, etc. It is basically a woolly bugger-style that can be tied using a variety of materials as long as orange or a brownish orange is the predominant color. I usually fish it deep and slow.

Hook: #10 - #4 2-3X long **Thread:** Stout black or orange **Bead:** Fluorescent orange

Tail: Bright orange or burnt orange marabou

Body: Orange or burnt orange dubbing with caddis green ice dub mixed in, or hot orange Krystal Flash chenille (See below for

suggested materials) **Hackle:** Brown palmered




- 1. Pinch the barb and slide the orange bead up to the eye of the hook. Line the hook shank with tying thread. Tie in a bunch of marabou fibers for the tail. Attach the brown hackle feather and leave it dangling. December 2007
- 2. Make a dubbing mix of your choice or use the hot orange Krystal Flash chenille and form the body of the fly. I like to trim it a bit to taper it as shown.
- 3. Wind the hackle forward in about 5 turnswith an extra turn right behind the bead. Whip finish and cement behind the bead.

Suggested materials for dubbing:

Paxton's Buggy Nymph, rust with a bit of caddis green or golden brown Ice Dub or brassy gold Fire Star dubbing mixed in.

Burnt orange Squirrel dubbing with a bit of the brassy gold Fire Star dubbing mixed in.

A mixture of orange and green or olive seems to be a very deadly combination.
