Swanson Lakes Wildlife Area By Lee Funkhouser

As many of you know, Mark Pinch and I have been attending meetings of the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife for the past few years working on the management plan for the Swanson Lakes Wildlife Area. The plan is important to us because the area includes Z Lake, a fly fishing lake that attracts some of our members.

In the past 18 months the advisory committee has completed the management plan and we are pleased to report that the WDFW has been working with us to maintain the Z Lake fishery as is, with some minor improvements regarding directional signage. There is access to the lake by trails, and for those needing easier access, the office at Swanson Lakes will provide a key to the gate so that one can drive to Z Lake. I am including the proposed public schedule for the finalization of the management plan for anyone interested. I have not fished Z Lake, but many of our members have and the reports have been good.

Public Presentation Schedule

May 11th the Swanson WLA Draft Plan will be released for SEPA and public review (30 days)

May 19th Swanson Lakes Wildlife Area Public Meeting will be held at 6PM at the WDFW Spokane Regional Office

June 22nd – Final WAAC review of the final plan (emailed out to WAAC members)

Early July – published on the WDFW website

How to get there:

Driving to Z Lake is relatively easy. Hiking into the lake itself from Telford Road is not as easy, but certainly doable with a float tube.

Driving out Highway 2 and past Davenport, you will look to take a left turn on Fictenberg Road, (approximately 42miles out of Spokane). Travel on Fictenberg road for 7 miles and take a left on Telford Road. Follow Telford Road for about 4 miles and then you will have to park and hike the rest of the way going due west.

Bert Shaber November 14, 1919 to March 25, 2015

Bert died in Spokane on March 25, 2015 at the age of 95. Bert was born in Wetumka, Oklahoma in 1919 and led an adventurous life that took him from his roots as the son of a small town grocer to a traveler of the world through his 30 year Air Force career. In World War II, Bert flew 67 combat missions in New Guinea as a B-25 bomber pilot. He contracted malaria and was sent to Spokane for recovery. Here he met and married Gloria Johnson of Corbin Park in 1945. Bert and Gloria had four children. They lived all over the United States, Hawaii, Paris, France, and Wiesbaden, Germany. Bert's final posting was as head of the ROTC at Michigan State University where he also earned an MBA. During his service career Bert attained the rank of Colonel, USAF.

Upon the family's return to Spokane in the early 90s, Bert managed 49 Degrees North ski resort while living in Chewelah, and Bert was active in local politics, serving on the Board of the PUD of Stevens County. He was also Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Eastern Washington University. Bert and Gloria continued their active lifestyle, traveling and visiting their children and grandchildren around the country. Gloria died in 1998.

Bert was an avid outdoorsman and a member of the IEFFC. He enjoyed participating in the Kid's Fishing program, but most of all he enjoyed fishing with his son, Randy. Bert also continued skiing until he was 90 years old. He is survived by his four children, eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. The family is planning a private memorial this summer.

FLY OF THE MONTH

Spokane Special

May 2015

Ed Plummer

Here is an old attractor-pattern dry fly from the days when we still used floss for fly bodies. It is akin to another old standby, the Renegade. The Spokane Special was named by Ed Plummer of the old Spokane Sporting Goods when he and Ed Karrer were partners in that business. It has been a favorite in the Northwest for many years and is especially good when Mayflies are out. This pattern is very effective at Browns Lake; indeed, it is a great temptation to any cutthroat. Because of its double hackle this fly is a very good floater.

Hook: Size 8-16 Tail: Red Hackle Fibers Rear Hackle: Grizzly

Body: Yellow Floss ribbed with Black Floss


Wings: Die-cut veined wing material (or substitute Grizzly hackle tips or poly


yarn)

Front Hackle: Brown



- 1. Pinch the barb and line the hook with thread. Tie in the tail.
- 2. Wind the rear hackle. Make it ever so slightly smaller than the fore hackle.
- 3. Attach the body and rib. Treat the body-rib with a coat of cement. Tie in the wing material.
- 4. Wind the fore hackle. Make it a tiny bit bigger than the rear hackle. Make a small head, whip finish and cement.





Upper Wheeler Reservoir Opens

Upper Wheeler Reservoir, owned and operated by the Wenatchee Heights Reclamation District (WHRD), has been closed to public access for some time. In April of this year, WDFW made arrangements with reclamation district and the Wenatchee Valley Fly Fishers to grant public access to recreational anglers under fly-fishing-only regulations. The agreement includes fish stocking, a land use agreement by WDFW and site maintenance by the Wenatchee Valley Fly Fishers. A permanent rule proposal allowing fly fishing only on Upper Wheeler Reservoir has been adopted by WDFW and will be included in the 2015/2016 Washington Sport Fishing Rules pamphlet effective July 1, 2015.

The reservoir will be managed as catch and release for trout species only. Statewide general rules for size and bag limits apply for all other game fish. The use of motors is prohibited. Anglers should consult the current sportfishing rules pamphlet for a definition of fly-fishing-only regulations. Upper Wheeler Reservoir is located approximately 11 miles southwest of the town of Wenatchee
