GOLD DREDGES IN IDAHO Communication from North Idaho Fly Fishers

In addition to monitoring mining proposals on the North Fork Clearwater, we are also tracking mining projects that are illegally impacting the Salmon River as well (see article and link below). Later this month (Sept. 18), the Idaho Land Board will be considering a Riverbed Mineral Lease in the bed of the Salmon River that we oppose. In addition to violating state law due to the lack of reclamation plans, and bonding, every suction dredge currently operating in Idaho is violating the Clean Water Act and is eligible for fines of up to \$37,500 per day, per violation. So, we're encouraging members, supporters and concerned citizens to monitor and photograph any suction dredging, to share reports with me at joppenheimer@idahoconservation.org and to notify the EPA of the time, location and activity observed by phone at 800-424-4372.

The good news is that EPA is finalizing a General Permit that would make these operations legal, but would prohibit them in designated Critical Habitat (Bull Trout, Chinook, Steelhead, etc.), in water quality limited streams (303d listed), in Wild and Scenic Rivers, and in some specific rivers in SE Idaho. Of course, the Final EPA permit, scheduled for release sometime this fall (Oct/Nov), will engender significant opposition from the mining community, and we (ICL) will be working to build support for the from boaters, fisherman, and other clean water advocates who want to see Idaho's water quality protected from the harmful effects of recreational suction dredge mining.

As a fisherman myself, I would be happy to meet with any members of your organization who might be interested in discussing these issues, speaking at an upcoming meeting and ensuring that we are coordinating our activities to safeguard the resources we treasure.

FLY OF THE MONTH

Orange Shrimp (Scud)

November 2012

This month's choice features a fly from the past. This fall I fished Muskegon Lake, a favorite from years ago. The conditions were not the best - bright sunshine, the middle of the day, the fish close mouthed. Few takes, no hookups seemed my fate. About the time I had to quit, I remembered that the cuffs in the lake always seemed to be full of orange shrimp. I tied on an appropriate pattern and suddenly I was into fish. Whenever the shrimp got near cruising trout, they would take it. Lots of our waters hold orange scuds, so the pattern works well in many spots. Give it a try.

Hook: Scud 16 - 12

Thread: Black or crange mono **Head:** Gold bead (optional)


Tag: Copper wire

Body: Orange wool, poly, or dubbing **Legs:** Brown hackle, wound like a rb


Shell: Pheasant tail fibers or brown Turkey fibers

Rib: Copper wire

- 1. Pinch the barb, insert the bead head, if used, and line the hook shank with tying thread. Tie in the copper wire to be left dangling.
- 2. Attach a bunch of shell fibers and the brown hackle as shown.
- 3. Tie in the orange body material and form a tapered body. Rib it with the brown hackle and trim the top.
- 4. Carefully bring the shell fibers over the top of the body and secure at the head. Leave some fibers extending past the bead or head for antennae. Make a small tag with the copper wire then segment the body with four tums of wire, secure and trim. Whip finish and cement.
