# **FLY OF THE MONTH**

## Schneider's Stone fly Nymph

They're coming back!! Sightings of adult stone flies and nymphs are happening from time to time on the Spokane River below town. I have seen small yellow stone flies come off the river by the Rifle Club My son, Brian, was fishing the river by Peaceful Valley a few days ago and chanced to put on a big stone fly nymph. He dropped it into a seam and was rewarded with a nice rainbow that took the big pattern when the usual smaller offerings had failed to produce any strikes. The days when clouds of the big salmon flies caused the streetcars in Spokane to spin their wheels have been long gone. The heavy metals flushed down from the Coeur d'Alene mines took care of that. But the cleaning up of the river is producing conditions that are compatible with the stone fly life cycles. A few have survived and are gradually increasing. Be ready! When you fish the river, have some stone flies handy and give them a try.

Hook: 2, 4, 6, long shank

Tail: Two quills from a Canada goose wing feather, tied to

spread into a narrow "V"


Body: Brown chenille Thorax: Orange chenille Overbody: Brown chenille


Hackle: Black, sparse, on thorax only (palmered there) and


turned down by overbody

- Pinch the barb and line the hook shank with tying thread.
   Wrap a bunch of lead wire on the forward half of the hook.
   Tie in the quill tail.
- 2. Form the body of brown chenille a little past halfway up the hook shank, tie off and leave the chenille dangling.
- 3. Tie in the black hackle and attach and form the orange chenille body.
- 4. Sparsely palmer the hackle over the thorax. Bring the dangling brown chenille forward to cover the orange thorax. Tie off, whip finish and cement.

Note: The same pattern can be tied with black or olive chenille.
