Our fly tying at The BigHorn Show was so well received they have asked Jim to put together classes for this years' show. We supplied tremendous support for Toys For Tots, helping a good number of children have a better Christmas. We again saw Gordy Olson and his staff put on a Christmas Raffle that was awesome in every way. I know that I could go on and on as there were numerous additional contributions to the successful year that we just completed and I hope everyone knows how much their individual contributions are appreciated. I know I am proud of what our club does in the Inland Empire.

We have a great group of officers this year and I am confident the challenges of 2014 will be met with continued success. This year we are emphasizing two things. First, I would like to see us bring our membership back to the 135 member level. We are currently at 125 active members, so this is an opportunity to bring in a guest for membership consideration. This will be an excellent opportunity for those who would like to be more involved to move into a more active position within the IEFFC.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD George Potter



The Distinguished Service Award was established to identify and reward individuals who have shown long and continued service to IEFFC. The award is not given annually, but is given when a member has distinguished service that is deserving of notice. This year the IEFFC has found George Potter to be deserving of that recognition.

George joined the Inland Empire Fly Fishing Club in 1966 and immediately immersed himself in the Club's affairs, including uncounted projects ranging from general clean up of fish habitat to sparring with Fisheries Department personnel in ongoing efforts to get them to rehabilitate various lakes, impose selective gear regulations on lakes and streams, provide access to fishing areas and anything else necessary to enhance the sport of fly-fishing.

His ongoing work to make our sport better was recognized formally in 1977 when George was named Fly Fisherman of the Year. Not one to rest on his laurels, George has continued his involvement in Club projects right up to the present. In the past he has worked tirelessly to see McDowell Lake treated with rotenone and then restocked with trout, and was successful in getting Sprague Lake and its surrounding waters treated and restocked, thereby making it likely the lake will rebound to its former glory of the 80s. The entire Coeur d'Alene and St. Joe drainages are now designated catch-and-release and he was the guiding force in the aeration project at West Medical Lake.

He is also heavily involved in the ongoing operations at Brown's Lake, a private lake that is important to many of the IEFFC membership.

George was named President Emeritus at the December 2008 club meeting and is only the fourth person to have this title and he is presently number five in club seniority.

Meanwhile, he fishes. He fishes a lot. Locally, much of the time at Brown's Lake. In Canada, especially Whitetail, as well as some new water he's discovered up in the Cariboo region of British Columbia. He's made his share of junkets to saltwater. Steelheading in the Clearwater and the Grand Ronde have been of interest at times. But through it all George has remained true to his roots, valuing the take of cutthroats in gin clear water on small dry flies above all else.

IFFF MEMBERSHIP By Chet Allison

As a former treasurer of the IEFFC and current board member of the WSCFFF, I would like to remind you as club members to join the IFFF. ROD CHOICE By Mark Pinch

I have had requests to clarify my comments in the September presentation regarding longer rods:

The longer, softer rod is of great value in handling long leaders under strike indicators especially with the added weight of balance flies and jiggies.

Flextec Streamtec Fly Rod from £189.99 - Choose Size: Which is the 10 foot, 5 weight.

This is a four piece rod with a great combination of good back bone and yet a soft tip for no Chironimid strike-break offs. It is about \$113 delivered to your door from England. You can order it from Ebay. Please understand that there are no warranties with this rod. Replacement sections are available at about \$40 each including shipping.

If you want a 25 year, no questions warranty, Orvis offers a 10 foot, 5 weight in their Clearwater line of rods. I have never fished this rod. At only \$200, it is worth a look.

Both rods are four piece with decent appointments

Another year is upn us. Will the fishing be as good or, hopefully, better than in the past year? Only time and effort will tell. For the first pattern of 2014, I've chosen an old standby, the Western Bee. It can represent a number of bugs the fish relish - bees, Caterpillars, yellow jackets, stone flies and caddis. Fish it wet or dry.

Hook: 12 - 8 regular

Thread: Black

Tail: Brown deer hair (optional)

Body: Alternating sections or orange


And black chenille (yellow is

Good also)

Hackle: Brown, wet or dry Wing: Grey deer hair

- Pinch that barb and line the hook Shank with tying thread. Tie in the Tail fibers. Attach the black and orange Chenille, leaving them dangling back.
- 2 Bring the chenille forward, alternating The black and orange and tying off After each section. Trim the excess.
- 3. Tie in the deer hair wing as shown.
- 4. Tie in the hackle in front of the wing, Wet or dry style. Form a small head, trim And cement.


