Silver Bow Fly Shop


One recent dreary day, I stopped by the Silver Bow Fly Shop to brighten things up by drooling at the goodies and gabbing about fly fishing. In the course of our conversation I asked Sean if he would recommend a fly of the month for February. We perused the approximately one million fly patterns for a while and he chose, with confidence, the Chubby Chernobyl. Sean pointed out its many attributes. It floats like a cork, the wings make it highly visible and help it to land upright on the water, and it can be tied in a variety of color combinations and sizes. It works well twitched on the water surface and, of course, it is great fished with a dropper and weighted nymph. I had fished this combination on the Snake at Jackson's Hole last September and can attest to its effectiveness. It is a bit tricky to tie, but once you get the hang of it, it's worth the effort.

Hook: 4X streamer 6 to 12 **Thread:** Color to match body 6/0 **Tail:** Bunch of Pearl Krystal Flash


Dubbing: Synthetic material (gold, red, tan,or orange) **Shell:** 2 m. closed cell foam (tan or brown, red body uses

black foam)

Legs: Silicone leg material **Wings:** Poly yarn, white



- 1. Pinch the barb and line the hook shank with tying thread. Tie in a bunch of Krystal Flash for the tail. Next, form a slender noodle of dubbing. Keep it separate from the tying thread. I use a dubbing loop. Wind the dubbing up to just above the point of the hook. Now tie in the foam for the over shell as shown.
- 2. Tie in a loop of poly yarn on top of the foam, fold both sides back and secure with a couple of turns of thread. Next tie in the legs on both sides so they extend out parallel to the hook shank. Use plenty of material so the legs can be trimmed to the desired length after the fly has been tied. Move the tying thread up to the spot for the next wing and legs.
- 3. Wind the dubbing loop over the wing-leg wraps to cover them. Continue winding the dubbing up to the tying thread. Repeat the previous process of securing the foam shell, poly wing, and legs. Cover the thread wraps with dubbing and put a Few turns of dubbing up to the eye. Remove the excess dubbing and whip finish. Carefully Trim legs, wings, and shell.

On May 1 and 2, the 2009 Washington Fly Fishing Fair is a fly fishing celebration sponsored by the Washington State Council of the FFF in Ellensburg, WA. It is an opportunity for all those interested in fly fishing to gather, exchange ideas, advance their knowledge and have some fun. The selection of Ellensburg as the event site is no accident. It is conveniently located for both Eastside and Westside fly anglers. The Kittias Event Center is a wonderful facility with sufficient room for fly tying demonstrations, casting competitions, the Danish casting games, free seminars and special classes. Plus, a river runs through it. In early May there should be some good hatches.

The fair starts at noon on Friday and concludes with a banquet and auction Saturday evening.

You can watch 125 tiers create their favorite patterns, ask them questions and learn their techniques. Tiers include: Henry Hoffman; Al Beatty; Bruce Staples; Harry Lemire; John M. Newberry; Steve Brocco; Darrel Martin; Les Johnson; Tak Shimizu; Paul Jacobson; Mark Romero; Karen Royer; John Olshewsky; Vern Jeremica; Glen Wilson; Preston Singletary; and Scott Peters.

In the fly casting competitions you can test your skills with other casters in the Northwest. A 5 WT rod competition will use a combined score for accuracy and distance to rank the casters. Get the tournament rules on the website below and read them before the competition!

There are fly tying classes (one given by Leonard Gross) and fly casting lessons for which a small fee is charged.
