### **LARRY MORSE** 9/6/1920-12/16/2022



September 6, 1920 was an important day in Mink, Montana, especially for Clayton and Emma Morse as they greeted their first child, a bouncing baby boy whom they named Laurence. The local doc was 40 miles away so Larry was born, like so many kids of the era, at home with only the help of a neighbor lady.

Life was pretty uneventful until about age seven when Larry happened upon some matches left lying around by one of the field hands. One thing led to another. Yep. He burned down the family home. By the way, a few years after the Morse family left Mink, the entire town was razed by fire which is why you cannot find Mink on any modern map.

The loss of the home, the onset of the longest drought in American history and the Great Depression combined to cause the Morse family to head west, eventually ending up on a big hay ranch in the Big Hole Valley, near Wisdom.

Although the family only lived on the farm for a year, it was an important time for Larry. He began fishing Mussingbrod Lake and the creek which drains it, along with the North Fork of the Big Hole River. The fishing was made even more enjoyable when Larry was presented with a spankin' new collapsible steel rod by his father. There was some work involved, though, as this was the Depression. Larry was assigned the task during haying season of catching enough fish to provide food for the dozen or so ranch hands at least once a week. Tough duty. The hook was set as firmly in Larry's jaw as in any of the fish he caught.

Fishing took a back seat after Larry's dad took a job with the Federal Land Bank, which meant moving the family to Spokane. This was the big city for the Morse clan. Larry and his siblings attended Roosevelt Grade School and then Lewis and Clark High School. Then it was on to college for Larry. He attended Washington State College in 1939, which also meant ROTC back in those years. He graduated in 1943 and was immediately sent to Ft Benning, Georgia. Before shipping off, he married his girlfriend of several years, Betty Allan. Larry headed to Europe and Betty headed off the a teaching position in Ellensburg.

Following his return home, Betty and Larry moved to Eugene where he prepped for his CPA exam. and worked for a small accounting firm. Upon passing the exam, they returned to Spokane where he joined a small firm. The owner of the firm passed away shortly after and Larry took over the practice and ran it successfully until his retirement in 1985. During this time, the Morse's had four children and lived up on the South Hill.

As Larry settled back into civilian life his interest in fishing returned. His saga began with a fly rod and reel, some monofilament line and a salmon egg. A single egg, down deep, at the inlet of Waitts Lake proved very productive, a technique shown him by Don Earnest, a fisheries biologist who became rather famous for treating area lakes with rotenone and then planting them with trout.

More egg fishing led to contact with various fly fishermen and a budding interest in learning the sport. This led to a fly tying class taught by Everett Caryl in 1958. Attending with Larry were **Mike Runje** and **Bill Eldenburg**, among others. These meetings and conversations gave Larry an awareness of a new fly fishing club which he joined in 1962. After joining the club his interest soon became an obsession to the point that experts such as **Fenton Roskelly**, **Gene Lorenson**, **George Potter**, **Fred Shiosaki** and boyhood friend **Al Stier**, along with many members of the Inland Empire Fly Fishing Club, became fishing buddies. Larry did more than his part, serving as Treasurer of the club and participating in numerous projects. He was named Fly Fisherman of the Year in 1972.

Larry fished many of the local areas, but also included in his fait accompli a number of more exotic locations. Those included such places as Argentina, Chile, New Zealand, Christmas Island, Belize, Tierra del Fuego, the Yukon, Quebec, and numerous other sites throughout the world.

Unfortunately, the aging process finally took a toll on Larry and he had to leave the sport. He remained in the club for a number of years and he represented the club in Kamloops where he was taught the new chironomiding techniques, which he then passed on to everyone in the club.

He left the club in the late 90's but his legacy lives on and we all can attribute much of our chironomid knowledge to his introduction of the techniques. He served us well and it is unfortunate that many of the current members did not have the pleasure of meeting him. It is members like Larry Morse who have made this club great.

#### FLY OF THE MONTH

**Two Minute Mosquito Larva** 

January 2023

**Barry Clarke** 

A fly that is easy to tie and also quite deadly. It can be used in numerous fisheries from rivers and streams to lakes and ponds. After all, we see mosquitoes pretty much everywhere we fish in the late Spring through early Fall months. It can be used as a nymph under an indicator or as a dropper under a dry fly.

**Hook**: Mustad Heritage R30 # 12-22.


Thread: Sheer 14/0 Tan.

**Body:** Tying Thread.


Rib: Tying Thread.



**Step 1**: Start your thread and wrap from the eye towards the bend covering the hook, but keeping a thin profile. Stop when the hook is covered to directly above the hook point.



**Step 3:** Tie in the Peacock herl with the tying thread and then make 3-4 wraps with the herl.
