Grant and Lottie Richie
Wallowa and Grande Ronde Rivers
Fishery and Hatches

Grant & Lottie Richie of Minam, Oregon will be talking about their home waters, the Wallowa and Grande Ronde Rivers, what you can expect of the fishery by the season and the big hatches of each season. Grant & Lottie bought the Minam Store business in 2011 and have been guiding and outfitting fly fishing trips for the past 14 years.



Minam Store Outfitters guides multi-day trips down the 40 mile roadless, wild and scenic section of the Wallowa & Grande Ronde. This is eastern Oregon's best trout fishery. They also guide day trips on the first 10 miles of the roadless stretch and shuttle back to Minam via the railroad tracks. This is a one of a kind shuttle via rail! Their home is on the banks of the Wallowa River at the confluence with the Minam River, giving them intimate knowledge of their home waters.

This is a great presentation about a very accessible fishery underutilized by lots of inland northwest anglers. Check out their web presence on social media, and hit up their website..they feature fishing, rafting, bird hunting and food and wine floats on the Ronde, Wallowa, and Snake Rivers. Washington State Council Fly Fishers International Fly Casting Skills Development Program Franklin Park, October 5 1-5 PM

The Fly Casting Skills Development Program (FCSD) helps anglers at every level sharpen their skills, unlock new opportunities, and have more fun on the water—at their pace, on their terms.

Fly fishing is equal parts art, science, and humility. The Fly Casting Skills Development program (FCSD) is about removing friction from that journey. Most people quit fly fishing not because they don't love it, but because they don't get good fast enough. FCSD helps solve that. It gives anglers—whether you're touching a fly rod for the first time or chasing perfection after decades on the water—a structured path to competence.

The program runs on four rungs: Foundation, Bronze, Silver, and Gold. Foundation is where you learn the language of fly casting: loops, roll casts, and basic accuracy. Bronze, Silver, and Gold are about leveling up—direction changes, distance, presentation. The results: More fish, fewer disappointments. And yes, there's bling: pins and recognition at each level, because achievement feels better when someone acknowledges it.

Important caveat: this is not about becoming a teacher. FCSD is not the instructor certification program. It's not an exam. It's a gym for your casting muscles. You go at your own pace, you decide how far you want to take it, and you'll know—by the tug at the end of your line—that it's working.

The secret sauce is starting at the beginning. Too many anglers want to skip to the sexy stuff. But most bad habits are born at the foundation. Fix those problems, and everything downstream is easier.

Bottom line: FCSD is the cheat code to more fun, less frustration, and better days on the water. The fish are waiting!



Summer Steelhead Returns Above Average By Idaho Fish and Game-August 7, 2025

Fish and wildlife populations are always surprising us — sometimes in bad ways and sometimes in good ways. This year's steelhead return is guilty of the latter, and the recent spike in returns is worth celebrating.

Before the run had even started, a contingent of Idaho Fish and Game anadromous fisheries managers — working with tribal and federal fisheries managers — predicted a total of 67,500 steelhead would return to the Columbia River, including 55,600 A-run fish and 11,900 B-run fish.

This year's return has already exceeded the preseason forecast, and as of Aug. 6 there have been 76,000 Arun steelhead counted while passing Bonneville Dam. The 10-year average for the same time span is about 30,000 but includes some very poor steelhead return years, so the 10-year average is a low bar to clear.

Steelhead runs are difficult to forecast from year to year. But why?

"The majority of this year's returning steelhead only spent one year in the ocean, so it's similar to forecasting jack Chinook salmon where we don't have any good indicators to predict returns," said Chris Sullivan, Anadromous Fisheries Coordinator.

Enough about A-runs, though. How's the B-run looking?

While A-run steelhead are definitely proving optimistic, Sullivan argues it's still a little early to determine how B-run steelies are faring. Typically this time of year, fisheries biologists need to wait another month before having a clearer picture.

Currently, about half of the fish that have passed Bonneville Dam are unclipped, or in other words, are wild. This indicates wild steelhead numbers are up this year, too.

Spokane Showdown 2025

Members of the Spokane Fly Fishers, IEFFC, Spokane Women on the Fly, and the Washington State Council of Fly Fishers International are tentatively scheduled to meet for a competition on October 4, 2025.



On October 3, a venue will be chosen between Amber, Medical, and Waitts Lakes. Anglers will be notified by social media, email or text of the venue. Two person teams from each club (as many teams as are available) will meet at the chosen venue and fish from 9AM to noon on October 3.

Prizes will be awarded for most and biggest fish, all fish are to be released, no fish pictured out of the water will count.

Following the awards, a barbecue is likely, and one might assume there will be beverages and conversation for all.

Friends of the River Coalition by Jerry McBride

On July 29 Jeff Pope and I stopped in to visit Dawn Wiksten and Ralph Shay at Dawn's home near the Snake Pit Restaurant. Her beautiful home is just off the highway that runs along the North Fork of the Coeur d'Alene River. Dawn is the president of Friends Of the River Coalition (FORC) and Ralph is a board member of FORC and a member of the North Idaho Fly Casters.

Dawn told us about the major activities of FORC which are:

- Multiple dumpsters placed along the river every summer for the use of visitors. Dawn shared her nickname among local residents which is "Dumpster Dawn".
- Trash bag dispensers for users of the river to use rather than throwing their trash in the river. Dawn's husband Sid (a mechanical engineer) designed the dispensers and arranged for their manufacture. Parker Subaru paid for the dispensers.
- Removal of heavy trash (tires, appliances and such) from the lower river once a year when the water level is at its lowest. This project is on hold during the I-90 bridge project near the take-out at Cataldo.
- They provided water rescue equipment to the Shoshone County Fire Department.
- They provide a shuttle bus for events on the North Fork.
- FORC is continuing to advocate for the restoration of a launch/takeout at Prichard on the North Fork.

Jeff and Ralph Shay hit it off right away because Ralph is also a fly rod builder. Ralph lives in Coeur d'Alene and typically spends four or five days a week on the North Fork. He is very adamant that the catch and release and no bait rules are followed.

FLY OF THE MONTH

Max Canyon

September 2025

Doug Stewart

The Max Canyon is a popular fly for summer steelhead. First tied in the 1970's on the lower Deschutes by Doug Stewart, it remains popular for steelhead in the upper Columbia system. 
Thread: 70 Denier Ultra Red thread Hook: Dai Riki 899 up eye, size 6 Tail: White and orange calf tail


Body: Back half orange yarn, front black yarn

Rib: Gold Oval Tinsel

Hackle: Black

Wing: White and orange calf tail





Tie in a black hackle wrapping 4 or 5 turns, then tying down so it forms a hackle about 7/8 of the distance back to the tail.

Tie down a bunch of white calf tail for a wing, keeping it on top of the hook, extending back just beyond the base of the tail. Again, tie some orange calftail on top of the white, about 1/3 the amount you used of the white.

Trim up the wing hairs nicely, pull the wing back and finish off the head. The fly should look like the above.
